Preaching as Primary Theology

As many of you know, I recently began a PhD through Charles Sturt University. The focus of my thesis is how the sacramental theology of the Orthodox theologian Alexander Schmemann might influence how we preach today in our Secular Age.

This project was born out of my ministry in Crookwell. The task of finding a word to bring to the congregation each week has challenged me over the years for reasons I struggled to explain — until I read a book by Andrew Root called *The Pastor in the Secular Age*. Root explains that what makes the life of

the Church so difficult today is that we live in a disenchanted world where even church-going folks struggle to believe that God actually does anything in our lives. We might believe in God – but we tend to relegate God to Heaven, and get on with things ourselves in the meantime.

As such, a lot of preaching today has been reduced to either lectures (trying to teach us interesting information) or to lessons in morality (telling us how we must live). But this is not the point of preaching at all. As Schmemann writes, "the homily

Its essence lies in its living link to the gospel that was read in the church assembly."

Instead, preaching is what we might call 'primary theology'. It is one of those places that, even today, we actually et to meet God; where God shows up and speaks to his people; and, where the Spirit transforms us into the promise of God. Take this famous painting of Martin Luther preaching, for example: the preacher points to the cross of Christ which is present whenever we worship together, so that we can see the Kingdom among us.



But today, it is hard to believe that this is possible. How often do you turn up at Church genuinely expecting God to show up? How often do sermons truly help you to see the presence of Christ?

That is what my thesis hopes to achieve – to set out a theory of preaching that can help the Church rediscover the point and purpose of preaching, *especially* in our Secular Age.

As such, I see an important link between my studies and the ministry you and I are living out each day in Crookwell. After all, we have said that our mission is to witness to God's love to the world from the Main Street to the Paddock. But to witness something, we must first have our eyes open to see it. May Christ continue to meet us in our worship then, and open our eyes to the good news that Christ has died; Christ is risen; and Christ will come again.

Meeting the Uniting Church Again for the First Time

Rev. Mark Faulkner is the Director of Rural and Remote Ministries for the Uniting Church, and is a key driver of the Saltbush Community, which seeks to connect Christian communities.

Recently, Faulkner spoke of the importance of small Christian communities, and their connection to the early days of Christianity. "I imagine in my head that Jesus was thoroughly rural, and after he visited any of the large towns...was pleased to be on the road out," Faulkner stated, citing Nazareth as a town so small that everyone came together to raise livestock, share resources, farm crops and care for the community.

Faulkner describes Saltbush as "reaffirming the place of diverse, smaller gatherings of Christians exploring life and faith together." Faulkner also noted that the future of the Church in our modern secular society will rely more on traditional communities rather than "large corporate models, economic prioritization, and monochrome socialization." Perhaps the future lies with simply gathering, and sharing our faith in the wider community.
