O Death, Where Is Thy Sting?

Each year on Easter Sunday,
Christians all over the world stand
and sing the words, "Where O Death,
is now thy sting? Hallelujah!" But
how often do we atop to think about
our theology of death – and why the
Christian hope for death differs to the
world around us?

During Lent this year, I will be leading a study on Fr Alexander
Schmemann's book *O Death, Where Is Thy Sting* – a short collection of sermons on the themes of death and Holy Week. These studies will help us to think deeply about a theme of which we don't often talk, so that we

might discover what is the hope of our faith.

By exploring a text from outside any of our own traditions, we will enter into a *mutual* journey of discovery, learning about the Orthodox faith together and reflecting on how it might speak into our own contexts.

I will provide copies of the book on loan to everyone participating in the study. If, at the end of the study, you would like to keep your copy of the book, I ask that you reimburse me the purchase price, or you can return the book at no cost.



About Alexander Schmemann

Fr Alexander Schmemann was an Orthodox Priest and the Dean of St Vladimir's Seminary in Crestwood, New York. Growing up as a Russian émigré in Paris, Schmemann became aware of the "presence on this world of something absolutely and totally 'other'." Convinced that this world (the Kingdom of God) illumines everything, Schmemann spent his life attempting to describe and understand his experiences. To this end, he became a leading liturgical theologian, seeking to explain to the Church what our worship reveals about the God we worship.

During the Cold War, Fr Schmemman was a regular contributor to *Radio Liberty*: a radio station which sought to provide information and commentary from the Western World into the USSR. Schmemman's sermons were a highlight of the programme, and a gift to Russian Christians living under the oppression of the Soviet regime.

The great Russian author Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn later wrote, "For a long time, with spiritual delight I have been listening on Sunday evenings, whenever possible, to the sermons of Father Alexander over Radio Liberty. And I was amazed at how genuine, how truly contemporary and of what high order is his art of preaching." This book is a collection of several of these sermons.

Andrew Smith to our church to lead
preaching, and talk about the church's
Mission Plan on February 4, 2024. Andrew
is a Minister from the Canberra Region
Presbytery.

Andrew's sermon will be based on Acts 8:26-39. This is the passage about Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch, which is one of the Bible passages that underpins the Presbytery Mission Plan.

The theme will be assimilation and accommodation, and how our congregation engages with our local community. Where are we accommodating? How are we changing ourselves to connect with the community on their terms? Where are we practicing assimilation? In what ways are we expecting the community to change to our terms in order to engage in faith?

Throughout 2022 and 2023, congregation representatives to Presbytery and ministers from these congregations discerned together a Presbytery Mission Plan for across the diverse congregations of the Canberra Region Presbytery. This plan has the potential to offer significant leadership for congregations as we serve together in God's mission.

Meeting the Uniting Church Again for the First Time

In 2023, the Uniting Church released its Statement of Missional Intent 2023-24 document, which was created to articulate Uniting's central purpose, strategy and values to its congregations, staff, volunteers, and the wider community.

The key message of this statement is that people are at the heart of everything we do. We aim to create a better future for more people and communities by disrupting entrenched disadvantage.

With this in mind, the statement has formulated a ten year plan (2022-2032) to do this, with key strategies around delivering services to communities, ensuring older people can live with choice and dignity, make a social impact, provide a safe and encouraging workplace, create new ways of helping people in need, and investing from sustainable funding sources.

As part of the continuing witness of the Uniting Church, Uniting works to challenge injustice and the systems that impose and perpetuate disadvantage on those who are vulnerable in our communities. Through the work of its advocacy, research, media and government relations teams, it seeks to influence positive change for a more just society.

In 2022, Uniting assisted more than 3000 independent living residents, over 7700 aged care residents, 4000 children enrolled in early learning, more than 3700 War Memorial hospital patients, and over 9200 home care clients.

The Moderator of the Uniting Church in NSW, the Rev Simon Hansford noted, "We cannot serve in isolation. The diverse and vital work of Uniting – serving young people and their families, our ageing community, people living with disability or injustice – will be less effective without the prayers of our Church, and the hope in Jesus which calls and renews us all. Our Church is less effective when we fail to hear the voice of Uniting, and to acknowledge – celebrate! – our achievements together."

The growth goals of Uniting that are outlined in the statement include leading congregations, engaging communities, and Being a leading and respected Christian voice on contemporary issues.
