Where O Death Is Now Thy Sting?

The Orthodox Church does not represent the Resurrection, like we do, with the empty tomb. Instead, they tell the good news of the Resurrection of Christ by recording the work of Christ on Easter Saturday, between the cross and the empty tomb. We call this the harrowing of Hell.

Taking seriously the claim of the Creed that "He descended to the dead", these Churches tell the story each year of how Christ's death and resurrection was effective not just for those who came after him – not just those who were part of the Church –

but indeed for *all*. The icon therefore shows Christ entering into Death itself, to take Adam and Eve by the hand, and lift them into the promise of the Resurrection. The logic goes that because Christ was Life itself, he could not die. And yet, he did. Therefore, the moment that Life with a capital L touched Death with a capital D, Death itself was overcome.

This may seem a strange image to those of us in the Western Church who have been taught that our faith is precisely about questions of Heaven and Hell. We often treat faith like it is some kind of eternal

But the central claim of our faith is far more profound than this. It is simply not that we go to Heaven when we die – but rather that the holy Triune God has entered into Death itself to claim us as his own. Therefore, there is now nowhere we can go that God is not.

Though this teaching might seem new to you, it is in fact very ancient — and is even a part of our own Western tradition. Think about the words to the hymn *Abide With Me* for example:

I fear no foe with thee at hand to bless Ills have no weight and tears not bitterness. Where is Death's sting? Where grave, the victory?

I triumph still if thou abide with me.

Or the last verse of *Guide Me O Thou Great Redeemer:*

When I tread the verge of Jordan
Bid my anxious fears subside;
Death of death, and Hell's destruction,
Land me safe on Canaan's side.

But perhaps nowhere is this good news more obvious than in that beautiful Wesleyan hymn, *Christ the Lord is Risen Today:*

Love's redeeming work is done; Fought the fight, the battle won; Vain the stone, the watch, the seal; Christ has burst the gates of hell.

Lives again our glorious king;
Where, O Death, is now your sting?
Once he died our souls to save;
Where your victory, O grave?

We are those who Christ has freed from the very depths of Hell itself, so that now, as St Paul writes, "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

May this be our Easter proclamation.

Aged Care Volunteer Visitor Scheme

The Australian Red Cross has introduced the Aged Care Volunteer Visitor Scheme - a free programme which connects a friendly volunteer with an elderly person who is feeling lonely or socially isolated, wither in an aged care facility or in their own home. It is fully funded by the Australian government, and is available to anyone receiving government subsidised residential aged care or a Home Care package.

Regular visits can add to the quality of life of the resident and help them feel involved with the community. Residents can be a caring person who is able to spend quality one-on-one time with them. Residents look forward to their regular visits which can lead to a friendship that is both long lasting and meaningful.

Residents and volunteer visitors can talk a walk or sit in the garden, play a board game, share a hobby, or just sit and chat over a coffee. All activities are undertaken within the grounds of the facility for aged care residents.

Visitors usually meet the resident at least once a fortnight at a time suitable to both parties, and they last for about an hour. Matches are made using various factors including location, culture, language, common interests and personality. All Australian Red Cross volunteers are required to complete an interview process as well as a National Criminal History check. Volunteers also attend a training programme, which outlines their role and responsibilities. A Support Officer provides ongoing guidance.
